The Center for Global Education (CGE) offers many programs during the school year. Programs are offered to students and the general public and available for credit or for audit. Some scholarship assistance is available for Mason students.

You can study abroad for as long as an academic year or as short as one week! You can attend Intensive Language Programs or Study Tours during December and January.

Students can now study overseas through one of our special semester abroad programs in the following locations. Students can earn up to 15 transfer or resident credits per semester.

Eligibility requirements: 2.5 or above cumulative GPA (Cork and Berlin require a 3.0) and at least 45 credit hours completed. Semester abroad programs include: Berlin, Germany, Brisbane, Australia, Galway, and Ireland.

- o Florence, Italy (Spring Semester)
- o Madrid, Spain (Spring Semester)
- o Oxford Honors (Fall by invitation)
- o Paris, France (Spring Semester)
- o George Mason University, Ras Al Khaimah.

Please be aware that the scheduled programs are subject to change.

In Order to Register for Spring 2009

- ✓ You must submit your final transcript from previous institutions. A block will be placed on your account, if you have not, and you will not be able to register for Spring 09 courses.
- ✓ You must submit your immunization records to Student Health Services. They are due before preregistration begins for Spring 09! You will not be able to register for classes if this is not turned in.

Undergraduate Apprenticeship Program

The Undergraduate Apprenticeship Program provides a \$1,000 stipend to 16-18 high achieving undergraduates undertaking original research or creative projects with their Mason faculty mentors.

If you are interested, you must apply with a faculty mentor who has agreed to work with you closely. That faculty member must also submit an application. In addition to meeting and working closely with their faculty members, students will meet as a group three times to discuss professional

development issues, including preparing for graduate school, graduate funding, designing a poster or other professional presentation, and writing abstracts. The spring semester deadline is 11/15th.

This program is designed to encourage Mason's high achieving students to become involved in research and creative projects early in their academic careers. We especially encourage transfer students to apply, since many of them have excelled in the program in the past and might not yet be

aware of this opportunity. Dr. Emil Chuck has designed an on-line application system for faculty mentors and their undergraduates students applying to the program. There are more details on the program there. Here are the links:

Academic V: a new Fine Arts Building for the AVT Department will include new studio spaces, galleries, computer classrooms, faculty offices, and general education classrooms. Expected completion is 06/2009.

Academic VI (Research II): a new IT&E research facility including labs, classrooms, conference rooms and offices. Expected completion is 06/09.

Field House (Phase II): This addition expands upon the Field House by increasing the training facilities, strength and conditioning areas, and resurfacing the infield of the building.

Northeast Sector: The completion of 5 new multi-story residential buildings, a new dining and fitness center, retail options and various recreation and office spaces.

Parking Deck III: A new 5-level deck with 1650 parking spaces at the north end of campus. Expected completion is 09/09.
